

YES Abroad Students Visit Gazi Husrev-bey's Library and the War Childhood Museum in Sarajevo

As part of language and cultural enhancement activities, the Kennedy-Lugar YES Abroad students in Sarajevo visited two important cultural sites: Gazi Husrev-bey's Library and the War Childhood Museum. The Gazi Husrev-bey's library, dating back to 1537, is a public library in Sarajevo that houses a collection of significant Islamic manuscripts in Bosnia and Herzegovina, many of which were donated by its founder, Gazi Husrev-bey. The students enjoyed a guided tour of the library and learned about the restoration of old manuscripts and books.





The students also visited the War Childhood Museum, which opened in 2017. The museum presents the experiences of children who lived through the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina during the 1990s, told through objects, video testimonies, and excerpts from oral histories. The day ended with a warm cup of tea at one of Sarajevo's most famous tea cafes, "Franz & Sophie."

They decided to decorate one wall in a hallway of the "Amer Cenanovic" middle school located in Butmir, a suburb of Sarajevo.
